THE IMPACT OF ABSENTEEISM

Each week, I often receive feedback from parents on points or issues raised in our newsletters. At the end of last term, I received a great deal of feedback on the article about the impact of student absenteeism.

I was so pleased to hear that the article created a lot of discussion around the table at home and even at a number of birthday parties and parent get togethers.

The impact of absenteeism is real and it is critical that families understand and consider the impact that taking their child out of school will have on them and their education. It is not fair to put young children, who are just starting out on their educational journey, behind the eight ball so early in their education and particularly when they are just starting to learn the basic fundamentals of literacy and numeracy that everything else they will learn is built upon.

We of course understand that absenteeism is, at times, unavoidable and that family events occur outside school holiday times. It is important for parents to understand the educational impact of taking their child/ren out of school and acknowledge that there may be a need to lower expectations of their child/ren's level of achievement.

I hope these articles on absenteeism continue to get parents talking and that they take them into consideration when planning their next holiday!

IT'S A NEW WORLD!

Recently we have had cause for concern with a couple of parents texting their child on the child's smart watch during class time!

Please be aware that our policy on smart devices is very clear.

We encourage students to wear watches during the day to help them tell the time and to help them develop independence and manage their commitments ie: keeping an eye on the time for when their music lesson is to start etc.

However, with new technology comes new challenges and with many smart watches communication with others outside school can become an issue during the day.

Phones and smart watches are great for safety and communication with parents and family before and after school, however, the use of such devices is totally inappropriate during the day whilst students are at school.

If parents need to contact their child during the day, they need to contact the office who will then pass on a message.

Parents need to be aware that if smart watches are used inappropriately during the day, students will be asked to remove the watch and they will be held in secure storage until the end of the day.

Students who continue to use smart watches inappropriately will not be allowed to wear the device at school.

LIBRARY REFURBISHMENT

Our library refurbishment is almost finished. With new shelving installed and, with the help of an amazing group of parents, our books have been reshelved and ready to go for borrowing.

The new shelving looks fantastic and with new carpet being installed shortly and new furniture being ordered soon, our Library is going to be the best Primary School Library in Victoria!!

Grade 3 and 4 students are currently learning a great deal about our new literacy program called Accelerated Reader (AR) which will form a large part of their Library program. The AR program will add real academic rigor to our Library curriculum and we are looking forward to the benefits that the AR program will bring to our students' literacy results in the coming years.

The AR program has commenced in Grades 3 and 4 this year and will be rolled out into Grade 5 and 6 in 2024 and 2025. Grade 2 students who are excelling in reading will also participate in the AR in due course.

The investment in our Library infrastructure and curriculum programs is testament to our commitment to provide our teachers with the very best resources available to ensure that they have everything they need in order to create engaging, exciting and academically rigorous learning programs for our students.

It is my belief that Templeton students and teachers deserve the very best and we will continue to invest heavily in our literacy, numeracy, inquiry and student welfare programs, and not to mention our buildings and grounds re-development program, for the benefit of our students.

LEARNING ABOUT RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS: Why are they so important?

The recommendations from the Government's Royal Commission into Family Violence in 2014 highlighted the important role schools play in teaching respectful behaviour to all students, and to promote gender equity in all aspects of school communities. Very strong links between gender inequality and family violence have been proven and documented. At the heart of the Victorian Education Department's framework for improving student outcomes lies student engagement and wellbeing. We know that a good education is about more than simply getting good marks, it is about supporting children to become respectful members of our communities who lead productive, healthy lives. Templeton Primary School's Values and Student Profile are designed to support our students to achieve this goal which exists for all young Australians.

Learning to build healthy respectful relationships:

- 1. helps equip children with the skills to communicate positively and respectfully, build positive relationships and challenge stereotypes that don't support equality
- 2. positively impacts overall academic outcomes, mental health, classroom behaviour and student-teacher relationships

As adults we have the greatest potential influence to shape positive attitudes among young people. The words and language we use with children carry important messages about gender, power and respectful relationships. It is important to challenge stereotypical views and opinions as they can have a significant influence on children's interests and development. Breaking down these stereotypes will help children develop their own skills and interests.

Consider the following gender stereotypes that often do not raise an eyebrow and then consider the alternative options that remove the gender lens!

- 'boys don't cry' emotions are important for everyone
- 'girls can't play certain sports'- sports are for everyone
- 'pink is too girlie / 'blue is a boys' colour'- colours are for everyone
- 'My mum is a truck driver and I don't like telling people"- occupations are for everyone
- 'that's a boy's chore, I'm not doing that' chores are for everyone
- 'Can I have two strong boys to help?' Can I have two strong children to help?
- "That is not lady like" Please use your manners
- "Did your Mum do your hair today?" Your hair look's great who did it?




REPTILE REBELS
